

Food retail outlets on campus have all implemented the relevant density and maximum occupancy requirements for dining, everyone is encouraged to take away instead of dining in.

Informal social spaces have been modified to meet the 1m physical distancing requirements with tables and chairs reconfigured and excess furniture removed.

Floor markings have been installed in all areas where staff and students may congregate including queues for service desks, food and retail outlets, lifts and pantries.

Contact-free services have been implemented as far as practicable, with physical distancing, hand hygiene and face masks used as control to reduce COVID-19 transmission.

4. Face coverings

The requirement of wearing a face mask is mandatory on IIUM campuses and buildings, and has been communicated and implemented in all areas of the University. Double masking is highly recommended. It can be done by layering two different types of masks on top of each other i.e. a cloth mask over a surgical mask or disposable mask.

Staff and students are expected to attend campus with their own appropriate face mask which must cover the nose and mouth.

The campus community is monitoring the compliance with the mandatory face mask requirement.

Face shield is highly recommended for customer facing staff.

5. Personal Hygiene

Set Personal hygiene is of utmost importance and must be continued post returning or re-enter of University campus by all staff, students, contractors and visitors.

Practice good personal hygiene at all times.

Regularly wash hands with soap and water or use hand sanitizer.

Avoid touching eyes, nose, and mouth.

Regularly wear clean clothes.

Limit personal accessories or jewellery.

Regularly clean and sanitize personal electronic gadgets such as mobile phone, tablets, etc.

6. Air ventilation

The University's ACMV systems have been adjusted to maximise the fresh air intake and increase the number of air changes in buildings. The large centralised ACMV systems have been programmed to provide daily full fresh air purges of buildings.

The ACMV system undergoes scheduled maintenance activities for its components and system controls including filter systems which are regularly maintained and changed to ensure effective filtration.

If possible, while working within IIUM work area and spaces it's highly recommended to open doors and windows as much as we can to allow more fresh air to move inside.

IIUM adopts the ventilation system guides and recommendations from the Malaysian Department of Occupational Safety and Health (DOSH).

7. Conclusion

Committee/ guests/ individuals involved with the event:

- practice physical distancing of 1 metre apart at all times;
- avoid the 3C (Crowded, Confined, and Closed conversation);
- practice the 3W (Wash hands, Wear mask and Warn);
- observe appropriate coughing and sneezing etiquette.
- wear mask at public areas.

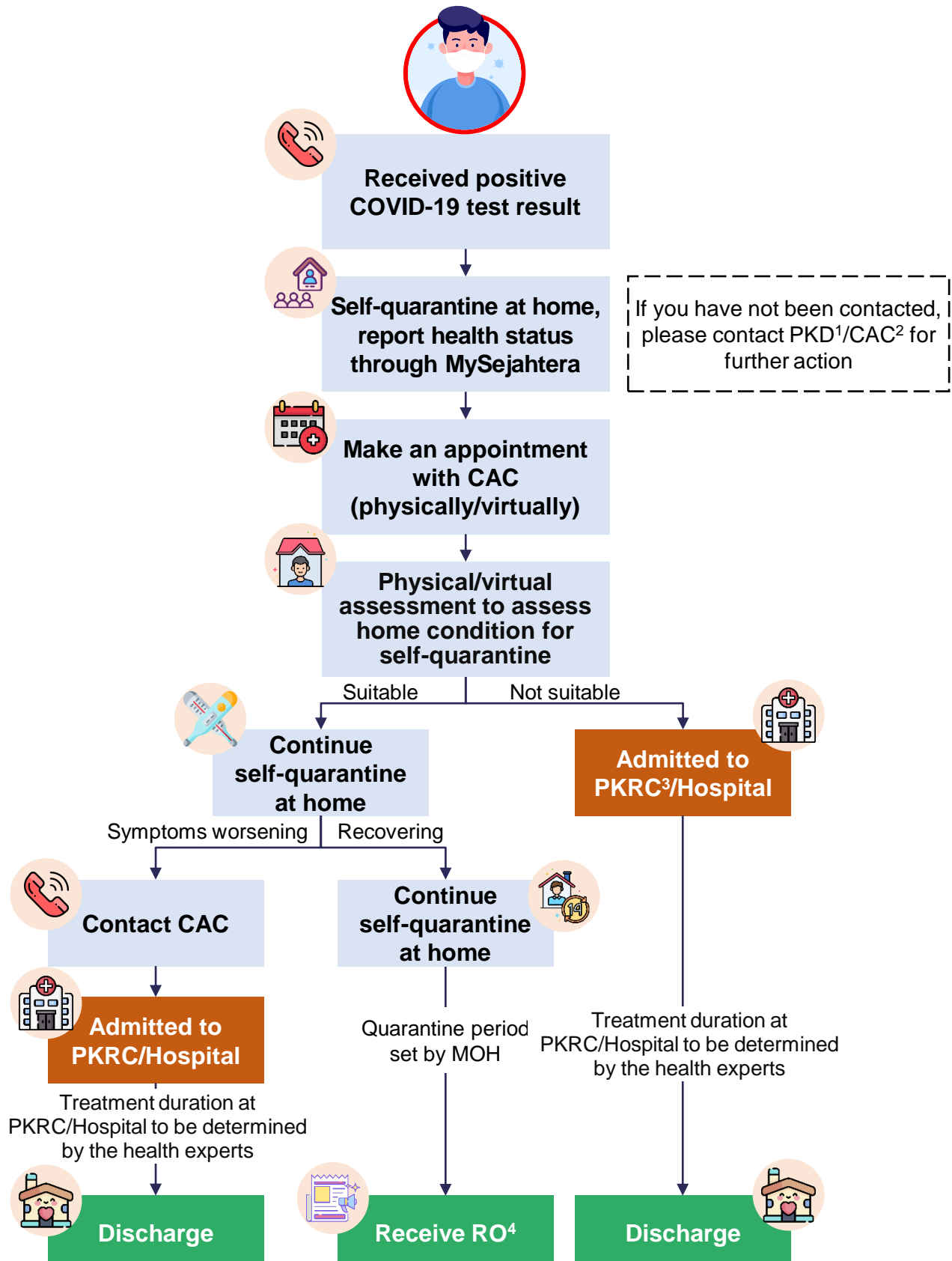

Positive case management flowchart

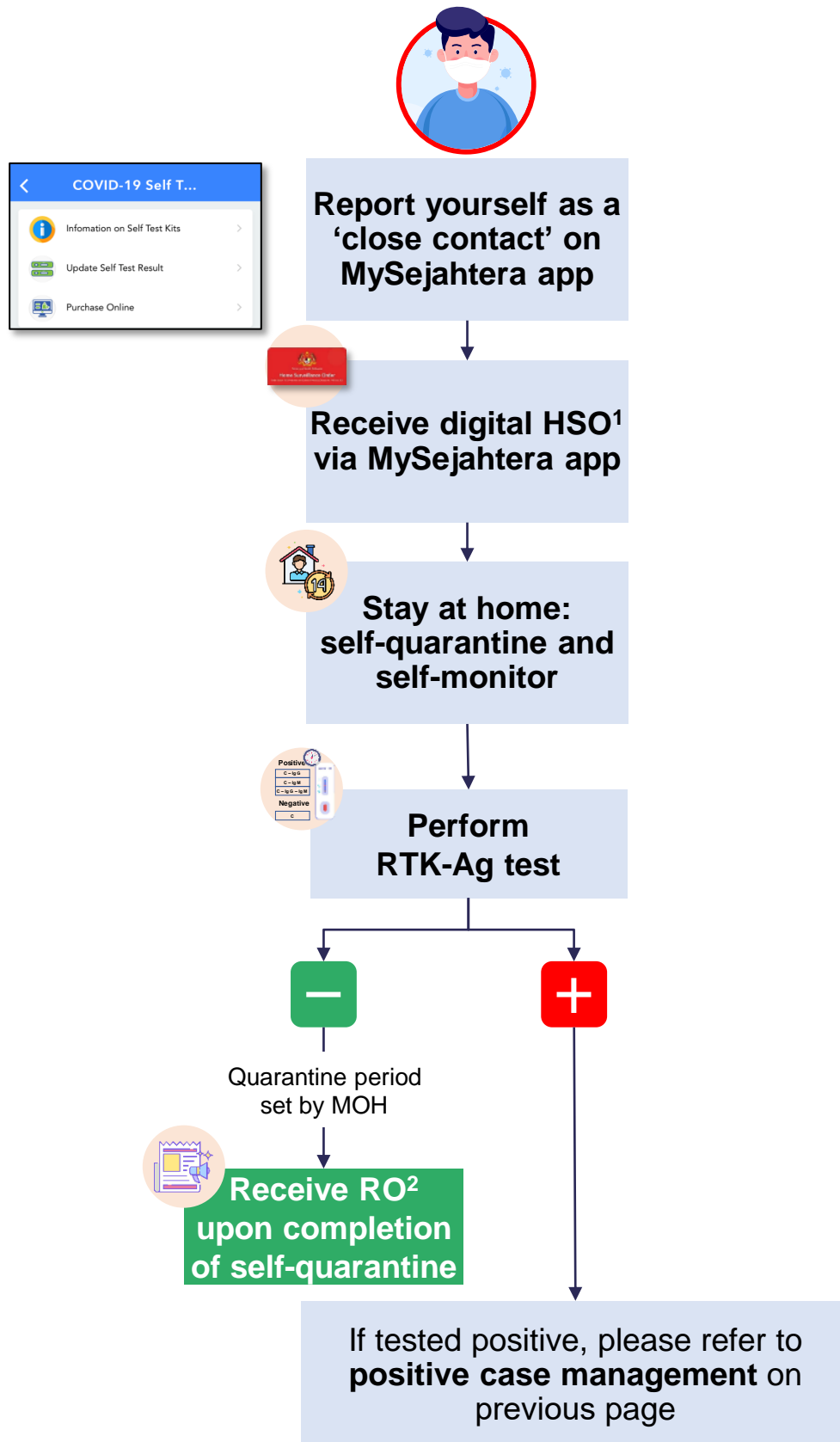

Case management

Self-quarantine guidelines

As a positive case/close contact



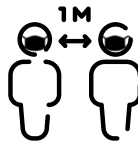
Do not leave your home during the quarantine period set by MOH



Do not share a room with family members



Self-monitor daily for symptoms and report through the MySejahtera app



Wear a face mask and maintain a physical distance of >1 meter if required to interact with family members

As a family member of the same household



Wear gloves when handling the utensils used by the patient



Place food and drinks outside the room for patient to pick up themselves



Wear a face mask when interacting with the patient



Wash your hands regularly with soap and water or use hand sanitiser

What to do if you are unable to self-quarantine safely at home?

You should quarantine at an identified quarantine station gazetted by the National Disaster Management Agency (NADMA)

General COVID-19 testing requirements

How to report COVID-19 self-test results?

All self-test results (positive, negative or invalid) must be reported on MySejahtera.

- 1 Launch the MySejahtera app
- 2 Select 'COVID-19 Self-Test'
- 3 Select 'Update Self-Test Result'
- 4 Fill in your details (phone number, name, email)
- 5 Fill in your address details
- 6 Select where self-test kit was obtained
- 7 Select the type of sample
- 8 Select your test result and 'Submit'

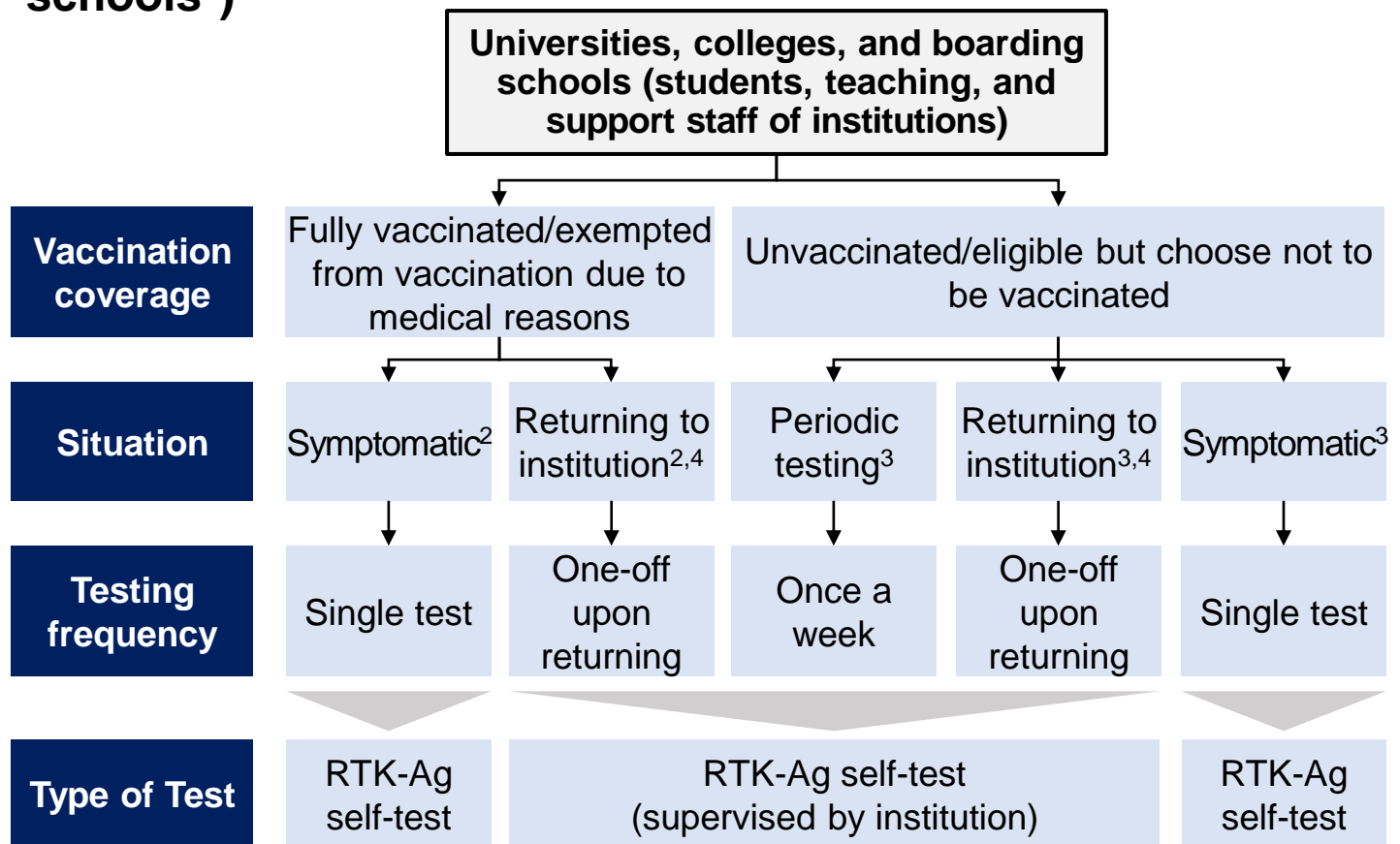
How to report close contacts?

All patients with a positive COVID-19 result will receive an order to list close contacts through the MySejahtera app.


- 1 Fill in your personal details correctly
- 2 Declare close contacts
- 3 Select 'Add Close Contact' for additional close contacts
- 4 The information will be verified by the authorities

B. Education sector (universities, colleges, and boarding schools¹)

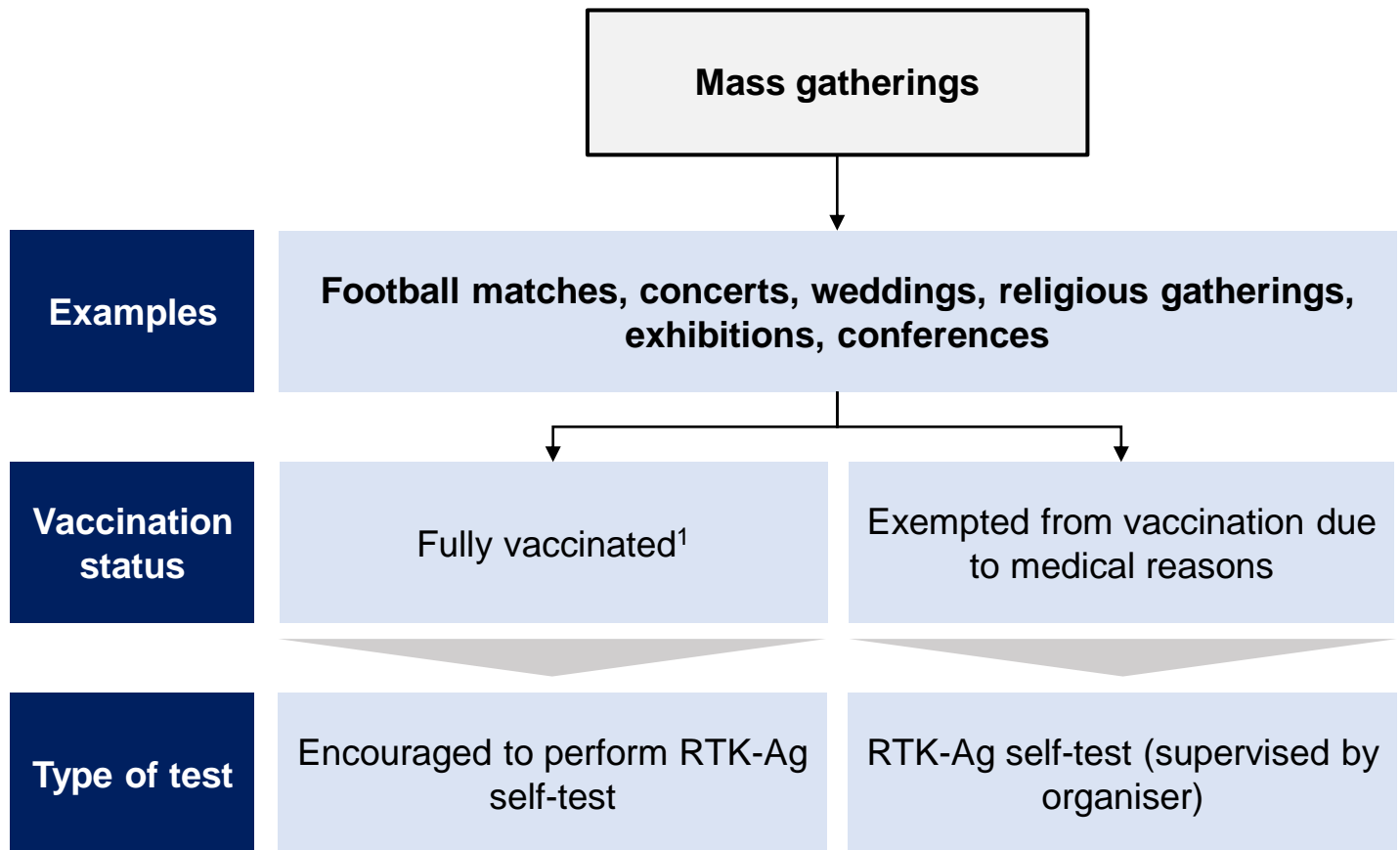


Note

- Authorities: Ministry of Higher Education (MOHE), Ministry of Education (MOE), relevant private institutions, and relevant agencies
- ¹Includes all universities, colleges, fully boarding schools, daily boarding schools, vocational colleges, matriculation colleges, teacher education institutions, and tahfiz centres/*madrasah*
- ²If symptomatic at the institutions or when returning to institution, the institutions should cover the cost of testing for students, teaching, and support staff of institutions who are fully vaccinated or are exempted due to medical reasons. Parents/guardians/students/staff should cover the cost of testing for students/themselves if symptomatic while at home
- ³For those who are unvaccinated or are eligible but choose not to be vaccinated, the individual should cover the cost of testing
- ⁴Returning from an extended leave of absence; examples include term break and holidays
- Individuals who are partially vaccinated will be considered as unvaccinated
- Symptomatic individuals who test **positive** for COVID-19 should visit CAC (public or private) or private health facilities for clinical status examination. Individuals will be referred to PKRC/hospital depending on their clinical status
- Symptomatic individuals who test **negative** for COVID-19 should receive treatment at nearby health facilities and self-monitor daily using the Health Assessment Tool (HAT) available through the MySejahtera application 
- Public servants are required to be fully vaccinated as per the Service Circular No.4 2021 (*Dasar Pelaksanaan Imunisasi COVID-19 bagi Pegawai Perkhidmatan Awam Persekutuan*)

3. COVID-19 testing requirements for specific activities

C. Mass gatherings



Note

- **Individuals who are symptomatic, unvaccinated or are eligible but choose not to be vaccinated are not allowed to attend mass gatherings**
- Responsible parties: Event organisers
- SOPs for indoor and outdoor gatherings are to be upheld by the organiser
- ¹An individual is only considered fully vaccinated 14 days after the second dose of a two (2) dose vaccine or 28 days after a single dose vaccine
- Individuals who are partially vaccinated will be considered as unvaccinated
